Math Department

The mathematics department provides course offerings in both general and college prep mathematics. The general course equips the student with the necessary skills for solving vocational life. The college prep course begins with algebra and continues through geometry, trigonometry, and modern analysis. These all provide a background for later college level courses.

This year the upper level, the math department initiated a system of allowing the student to work at his own pace. This provides each individual with the opportunity of completing the required work and moving on to other areas within a year.

Science Department

The philosophy of the Science Department members is that discovery is the heart of science. We believe that there should be an emphasis on scientific inquiry and experience-centered activities for the student, and that the courses should aim to stress the development of concepts and principles rather than the memorization of facts. In accordance with this philosophy of science learning, the members of the Science Department feel that their role is to guide the conceptual learning of students rather than to serve as dispensers of information.



The traditional course of English at each grade level is being phased out, and, in its place, some twenty four new courses are being planned for implementation into the curriculum. These will all be one half year in length and for one half credit.







The W.H.S. Debate squad participated in twelve varsity tournaments this year including our own hosted tourney on Saturday, November 15.

At each tournament entered, the debaters participated in an average of three rounds of debate. Our own home tourney was attended by nearly sixty schools and had over three hundred students participating, Hopkins won 1st place in both "A" and "B" Divisions at our tournament.





This past year, approximately 45 juniors and seniors undertook a series of projects working with youngsters. The most popular and successful of these projects was Student Concern.










