... Fifty-two man, flood left... forty-three zone, slash right... The '73 football season was one of great expectation. A tough, gruelling two weeks of practice before school really paid off in a successful scrimmage against a good Belle Plaine team. The Chief's defense opened the season against St. Anthony like a mean, crushing machine vielding no points and only one first down. When Nate, Buesgens, Boll and friends duplicated this outstanding performance a week later against Norwood the Chiefs were off on their best season in many years. The third consecutive win was notched Waconia trounced Watertown. After a loss to defending champion Eden Praire, tri-captains Schelitzche, Segner, and Bost led a fired up squad into the Homecoming game against the Buffalo Bison. Tony roared for 232 yards rushing in that game and a ferocious defense not only punished but shut out their opponent for the third time in the season. The rest of the season became pretty disappointing. but Tony Schelitzche (1600 yards in two years) and Nate Gregory (All-Conference) were among those who made this one of the better football seasons that Waconia has enjoyed in some time.


























GARA







Personal confidence. Knowledge that we've got a competitive team. The basketball team worked not only on fundamental skills and drills, but on the mental aspect of the game. Coach Luebke thinks "mental discipline" is playing a good game. "If you don't agree with an official's call, you don't get upset, you realize referees are human too...he makes a bad call and you respond "yes sir" or "no sir", you hand the ball to him, you never throw it at him..." It was just this combination of skill and poised confidence which would lead the Chiefs to defeat a previously unbeaten and highly ranked Buffalo team. People who noticed the improved skills of this year's basketball Chiefs were projecting a good season. The first game, a narrow loss to Shakopee was an unfortunate omen for the season. Perhaps it was a lack of this poise and "cool" rather than a lack of ability which cuased the Chiefs to lose 9 games by less than 10 points. Tony Schelitzche had another outstanding season and was recognized as an All-Conference selection. Joel Wyttenhove and Bruce Neubauer were honorably mentioned.




















MINI-MUSICAL


Two shows: "In The Zone" and "Sorry, Wrong Number"


What are the feelings of men as they pass through an enemy zone on a ship loaded with explosives? "In the Zone" conveyed the feelings of suspicion and anxiety that are very much part of this situation. The crew have watched the suspicious actions of Smitty, a shipmate. He searches through his belongings each night and brings out a locked metal box, which he places under his mattress. The crew believes it is a bomb, and they react strongly against Smitty. They take care of the "bomb" by placing it in a pail of water. Smitty is tied up and subjected to embarrassing questions and accusations by his shipmates, all as a result of a locked metal box containing personal letters from a girl he had loved. The dangers of a war. and tensions and suspicions of all involved could be more fully understood and felt by the audience after seeing the performance of "In the Zone".

Sorry Wrong Number, the 2nd half of "Two For The Show," presented on February 19, carried on the feeling of suspense created by "In The Zone". The plot concerns Mrs. Elbert Stevenson, an invalid who overhears plans for a murder. She has only a few hours to rescue the unfortunate woman, and to report the murder to the police. Time is running out: while Mrs. Stevenson is trying to cut through bureaucratic red tape. She calls a series of operators and begins to suspect that she is going to be murdered. Finally she gets through to the police and just as she gets Sergeant Duffy on the line she is murdered. Her slayer apologizes to Duffy, "Sorry Wrong Number" and hangs up, leaving the audience stunned.















Swingin' Chiefs








Friends I will remember you










THE LAST DAYS OF SCHOOL & FINALS






















Marching Band "Gets it on"







Always on the job















FUTURE HOMEMAKERS




CHIEFTAIN Getting by with a little help


