GIRLS' BASKETBALL STRONG START BOOSTS CHIEFS NEAR THE TOP

Although picked to finish 5th or so, at around .500, the surprising Chiefs held first place for fifteen straight games, dropping to second with just two seconds left in the sixteenth and final conference game. That Shakopee field goal clouded an otherwise very successful season. The defense minded Chiefs rattled off thirteen straight conference wins before a three point upset by Mound, setting up the dramatic showdown with Shakopee. Waconia had previously defeated Shakopee by a single point in double overtime. A highly ranked Delano team recorded two non-conference wins against the Chiefs, as Waconia finished the season second in the Suburban West Conference and second in District 17-A. The Chiefs' strength was balance in a blend of talent: senior RONDA GOETZ was All-Around Player; senior BRENDA ANDERSON was Floor Leader in Assists; senior TERRY HONEBRINK was Best Defensive Player; senior LORI WOLLIN was Coaches' Player: junior ROBIN GOETZ took honors as Leading Scorer; junior LISA JACOBSON was selected as All-Conference Player. Excitement in the season was generated by a number of close games ( 14 of 21 were decided by fewer than 10 points), by fourth quarter comebacks, and by the persistent demonstrations of tenacious defense and patient offense.

To be able to hold their own against bigger and stronger personnel, the 1980-81 Chiefs relied necessarily on a pressing, more aggressive style of play. A hustling full court press spearheaded by guards TROY WILLIAMS and DALE LAUMANN, dependable seniors like BOB DRESSEN and STEVE YETZER, and the free wheeling play under the boards by junior MIKE LEIVERMANN combined to unpleasantly surprise the opposition. Six of eleven losses were by 8 points or less, and, it should be noted that several players including seniors STEVE YETZER and eventual Most Valuable Player TROY WILLIAMS missed games due to injuries. Ready to fill in were seniors $B O B$ GIESINGER, BRUICE WAGENER, and DOUG GERDING, while juniors CHET LARSON and JOHN MENDIOLA also saw entensive playing time. The Chiefs played very well in an overtime win over Delano, a one point loss to Buffalo, a big win over Minnehaha Academy, and a four point loss to power house Marshall-U in District Tournament play. Among the factors contributing to their success, Coach John Laulainen credited the individual improvement in many of the players (MARK EBERT was named Most Improved), and the overall intensity and aggressiveness displayed by the group. Junior leadership was provided by DALE LAUMANN and MIKE LEIVERMANN, who was named to the SWC All-Conference Team.
