conservatism and swept Jimmy Carter out of the White House with a surprise landslide at the polls.





maker afloat. When their 1981 line didn't sell as predicted, the corporation started looking for further federal generosity.









1980 V-CHIEFS DOMINATE SUBURBAN WEST CONFERENCE IN UNDEFEATED SEASON

The indoor net set also enjoyed a banner year in 1980. Coach Blassey's team dominated the Surburban West Conference and concluded regular season play as undefeated Conference Champions. In winning both the Crow River Invitational and the West Carver Classic, Waconia took five straight matches without losing a single game. In fact, throughout the season, Waconia shut out 18 of 23 opponents. The potential talent of the senior class emerged in the performance of the six seniors, particularly Terri Honebrink, Brenda Anderson, and Ronda Goetz, all of whom were named to the All-Conference Team. Seasons highlights, the two tournament and Conference Championships, a twenty-one winning streak, were overshadowed by an unexpected second place finish in District 17A to Delano, a team twice previously defeated by Waconia. Not to be overshadowed, however, was the cooperative attitude and enthusiasm shown by the players toward the successful program. 













GIRLS TENNIS MOST SUCCESSFUL YEAR YET FOR GIRLS' NET SET

CLAPS AND KICKS SPUR ON CHIEFS TO FALLTIME VICTORIES




























FOOTBALL - 1980 WINNING SEASON ELUDES CHIEFS ONE MORE TIME






GIRLS' BASKETBALL STRONG START BOOSTS CHIEFS NEAR THE TOP


Although picked to finish 5th or so, at around .500, the surprising Chiefs held first place for fifteen straight games, dropping to second with just two seconds left in the sixteenth and final conference game. That Shakopee field goal clouded an otherwise very successful season. The defense minded Chiefs rattled off thirteen straight conference wins before a three point upset by Mound, setting up the dramatic showdown with Shakopee. Waconia had previously defeated Shakopee by a single point in double overtime. A highly ranked Delano team recorded two non-conference wins against the Chiefs, as Waconia finished the season second in the Suburban West Conference and second in District 17-A. The Chiefs' strength was balance in a blend of talent: senior RONDA GOETZ was All-Around Player; senior BRENDA ANDERSON was Floor Leader in Assists; senior TERRY HONEBRINK was Best Defensive Player; senior LORI WOLLIN was Coaches' Player: junior ROBIN GOETZ took honors as Leading Scorer; junior LISA JA-COBSON was selected as All-Conference Player. Excitement in the season was generated by a number of close games (14 of 21 were decided by fewer than 10 points), by fourth quarter comebacks, and by the persistent demonstrations of tenacious defense and patient offense.




















BOYS' BASKETBALL: BOYS REBOUND TO FINISH SEASON STRONG

To be able to hold their own against bigger and stronger personnel, the 1980-81 Chiefs relied necessarily on a pressing, more aggressive style of play. A hustling full court press spearheaded by guards TROY WILLIAMS and DALE LAUMANN, dependable seniors like BOB DRESSEN and STEVE YETZER, and the free wheeling play under the boards by junior MIKE LEIVERMANN combined to unpleasantly surprise the opposition. Six of eleven losses were by 8 points or less, and, it should be noted that several players including seniors STEVE YETZER and eventual Most Valuable Player TROY WILLIAMS missed games due to injuries. Ready to fill in were seniors BOB GIESINGER, BRUCE WAGENER, and DOUG GERDING, while juniors CHET LARSON and JOHN MENDIOLA also saw entensive playing time. The Chiefs played very well in an overtime win over Delano, a one point loss to Buffalo, a big win over Minnehaha Academy, and a four point loss to power house Marshall-U in District Tournament play. Among the factors contributing to their success, Coach John Laulainen credited the individual improvement in many of the players (MARK EBERT was named Most Improved), and the overall intensity and aggressiveness displayed by the group. Junior leadership was provided by DALE LAUMANN and MIKE LEIVERMANN, who was named to the SWC All-Conference Team.




WRESTLING PAUL GREGORY TAKES FOURTH PLACE AT STATE




CURRENT EVENTS



MOUNT ST. HELENS - With a blast comparable to the largest H-Bomb ever tested, Mount St. Helens erupted on May 18. Despite all the warnings, 32

people died and a paralyzing blanket of gray soot dropped over cities, farms and highways as far east as Montana.



REFUGEES FLOOD FLORIDA - In a little more than two months, 110,000 Cubans descended upon the United States. The sudden influx forced Florida's governor to declare a state of emergency. Cuban President Fidel Castro claimed it was to teach the U.S. a lesson for welcoming Cuban hijackers as heroes.



THIRD CANDIDATE - Although John Anderson won only a small percentage of the popular vote in the presidential election, he stressed that his campaign was not wasted, "We have put the major parties on notice that they can never again come up with the kind of choices they have this year."



POLISH UNREST - Poland's striking workers brought down the government and dangerously provoked the Soviet Union.



TELEVISION STRIKE - Over 1,200 actors went on strike demanding compensation for videocassettes and cable TV. The long-winded strike lasted several months, delaying the new fall programs.



HOCKEY VICTORY - For the first time in 20 years, the American hockey team won the hockey gold medal, defeating

the world champion Russian team. The American team had only been playing together for five months.



'SHOGUN' FEVER - The 12-hour television mini-series captured rare top ratings for NBC. Richard Chamberlin played the lead in the story about 17th century Japan.



BORG WINS, AGAIN - Sweden's Bjorn Borg falls to his knees after beating John McEnroe of the United States to the All England Tennis Championship for the fifth straight year at Wimbleton.
