




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

INTRODUCTION

It Was *I* of Those Years!

A number of things happened during the 1990-91 school year to make it a memorable one.

On February 22, 1991, newly elected Governor Arne Carlson visited the Waconia schools. After touring both the high school and Southview Elementary, he gave a speech on the importance of education to the juniors and seniors in the WHS auditorium.

The girls' volleyball team had an exciting run at the state championship. They finished 5th in the state tournament at the Met Center. In addition, the Waconia Lakettes won the Class B state danceline competition for the third year in a row.

Lunch was given a new twist with the introduction of computer accounts. Instead of using lunch tickets, students have computer accounts into which they deposit money. When they eat lunch, they give their account number to one of the cooks.

Sixteen-minute homerooms became an everyday event as students were introduced to Whittle Communications' daily news programs. Kindergartners became a common sight in the school as they moved here from Southview.

Fears of war in the Middle East swept through Waconia High School. On January 15, Superintendent Frazier gave an emotional speech followed by the whole school's observing a moment of silence. On January 16, 1991, the war against Iraq became a reality. For the duration of the war in the Gulf, students and their families worried about their friends and loved ones stationed in Saudi Arabia.






The Fantasticks, this year's fall musical, was presented on November 8-10. It is a gothic romance with a twist. Two neighboring farmers want their children to be married. They use reverse psychology by pretending to feud and forbidding the lovers to see each other. The fathers hire a professional abductor (El Gallo) to kidnap the daughter, then allow the son to defeat him and rescue her. Thus, the feud is ended and they prepare to live happily ever after.

However, when the evening of the abduction turns into day, things take on a different hue. The children discover they aren't quite as in love as they thought, and the fathers become aware that the children wanted the marriage from the beginning.

El Gallo reappears and arranges a nasty trip around the world for the boy, giving him a new appreciation of his home. El Gallo seduces Luisa and purposely disillusions her, giving her new understanding and appreciation of her home.

The fathers reconcile their differences as do their mature children. El Gallo reveals that the hurts he caused were only meant to bring maturity to the families' relationships.

The musical was unique in that it utilized a small stage with a cast of only eight characters, all of whom remained on stage throughout the production. The eighth character (Heather Christenson) was a mute who moved the props as needed.





Does random drug testing of high school athletes violate their civil rights?

That was one of the questions asked at the 1991 Minnesota Mock Trial Competition, an academic contest that teaches students about the law and our legal system.

The Mock Trial participants practice about 2-3 hours a week. They assume the roles of lawyers and witnesses to argue fictitious cases before actual lawyers who have volunteered to act as judges. Waconia's Mock Trial is guided by their adviser Mrs. Michelle Roatch and Tim Looby, a local attorney.

In a competition, an "attorney" can lose the trial, but still end up winning the competition. Students receive points for good arguments, etc. The team with the most points wins. Waconia's team won one and lost one competition this year.



The gold medal winners at the Region 8 meeting advanced to the state competition held on April 25, 26, and 27 in the Twin Cities.



FFA, Math League Focus on Specific Areas

Future Farmers of America is an organization in which students can learn more about agriculture.

Students take part by being in contests and traveling to state conventions. Seven students traveled to Kansas City for a national meeting. The Waconia FFA also raised money for Camp Courage. At the Minnesota State Fair some students set up a booth that won second place.

Adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing, and a little bit of common sense sum up Waconia High School's Math League. The league practices every Wednesday after school for an hour. One Monday a month, the league travels to Shakopee for a meet. There, the tests are divided into four parts — A is algebra, B is geometry, C is trigonometry, and D is calculus. The members each pick two categories and take those tests as individuals. When they're finished, the team works together on a final test which is much more difficult than the individual tests.



Wellness Day Promotes Healthy Choices




Above. Garret Gallus raps about music and its influence on drugs and alcohol at Wellness Day.






Brother and Sister from Vietnam Graduate in Adoptive Country


Lee and Linh's father wanted his children to have a better future here than they could have in Vietnam. Jobs are easier to get and the pay is better.





Desert Shield Turns into Desert Storm





Departments Adapt to Overcrowding

Due to increasing enrollment and the kindergarten's being moved to the senior high building, several departments had either to lose space or relocate altogether.

Mr. Lindemann, head of the Industrial Arts Department, looked on the loss of a room with mixed feelings, citing that there is better communication between department members because of shared classroom area.

The Home Economics Department curriculum includes several different classes, most needing specific equipment and lab space. Mrs. Lehrke felt the loss of one home ec classroom created occasionally crowded conditions in the one remaining classroom, especially during sewing labs. Mrs. Mason, of the Art Department, seemed to have taken the move best. Formerly the small engines room, the new art room is better ventilated, plus it has an outside exit and more floor space and storage space. The room also includes a smaller room, used exclusively for ceramics.





Students Learn through Labs

Some students prefer classes that allow hands-on work and a chance to work independently. Video productions, science classes, foods and computer/business classes all offer lab time.

Video production students must produce a weekly news program that is aired on the local cable station. They are allowed to spend most of their class time preparing the program.

household. Students learn how to manage their finances and how to prepare meals. Much time is spent preparing food in the cooking lab.









Studying takes up a large portion of most students' lives. For students to do well in their classes, they have to study outside of them. Students' study habits can be categorized into three areas.



and always study for test — the night before. Although these students often waste study time, they rush to complete assignments or study for tests at the last minute.

















At home the volleyball team was greeted with a reception where the community could celebrate and share the great accomplishments of the team. This was definitely a season to remember for the entire team.











WRESTLING




BASEBALL

With eleven players returning next year, Mr. Hullander feels the future of the team looks good.














