





A Look at the News 94

The events of the year were ones of confrontation,

disaster, and peace.

On September 13, 1993, with three American Presidents present, two old enemies shook hands in peace. Yassar Arafat, of the Palestine Liberation Organization and Yitzhak Rabin of Israel signed a once unimaginable peace treaty.

Pope John Paul II used some of the harshest rhet-oric of his 15-year papacy to decry abortion and euthanasia during a four-day trip to the U.S. in August

1993.

Floods that washed across the Midwest may have been the worst in American history, and captured the concern of people nationwide. As thousands were left homeless, some farm produce prices rose and insurers had to pay out millions in compensation.

An earthquake measuring 6.6 devastated the Los Angeles area on January 17, 1994. Sixty-one people died, and L.A.'s vital freeway sytem was badly damaged. The earthquake damage was the costliest of any

natural disaster in U.S. history.


An Amtrak train hurtled off a bridge into a bayou in Saraland, Alabama, plunging its passengers into a nightmare. The deadliest wreck in Amtrak's history killed 47 people aboard, but 159 survived.


Russia experienced political upheaval more typical of a third world nation. A coup attempt tried to wrest

power from Boris Yeltsin.

The world was drawn to Somalia's starving children in 1992, but almost driven away by fighting adults. Pictures of abused American servicemen outraged the

















Foreign Exchange Students: Who Are They?


Two foreign exchange students attended classes at Waconia High School this year Tanya Mrazikova and David Hitchinson.





Marching Band Looks Back at Winning Year




Student Council Strives to Improve School





Mock Trial Gives Team Legal Experience


The case for the 1993-94 mock trial participants involved a 2nd-degree murder charge against a homeowner who pleaded self-defense in the killing

"Love Rides Rails" Chosen as Spring Play




This year's spring play was "Love Rides the Rails," a melodrama about a small railroad's fight for survival against a larger railroad.







From 1918 to 1936 the original school building housed grades 1-12. In 1936 the auditorium and 3rd floor classrooms above it were added. The areas currently used for kindergarten, home ec, woods, and drafting were added in 1955 along with the first half of the cafeteria. The second part of the cafeteria, the current art room, and additional industrial arts room were added in 1961. The major portion of what is now the high school was built in 1968 - including the offices, gym, music rooms, classrooms, and library.

When asked how the new facility would meet the needs not met by the current high school, Superintendent Ric Dressen indicated that "additional educational opportunities will be available to students including additional media, technology, laboratory, and performance resource areas." Principal Robert Lind added that a new school would help by "not having to serve two very different groups (junior high and senior high) in the same facility." He also cited inadequate space in the present building for computer labs, media space and technology, lockers, athletic facilities, meeting rooms, and a cafeteria serving area.

The new building, scheduled to open in the fall of 1994, is expected to provide all of the above as well as additional classroom space both at Southview and at the

newly formed middle school building.

In addition, 1993-94 marks the

last year that Waconia's athletic teams will be called "Chiefs."




SOCIAL: Learning the Way of the World




SPEECH: Practice in Communication Skills










Injuries Hinder Rebuilding





Looking ahead, Coach Connie Manuel predicted, "We will be graduating three seniors and have eight returning letter winners...Look for us to challenge the top again next year!"









Johnson, the girls basketball team had a good season, ending with an 11-5 finish. They placed third in conference play.





Wrestling Ziermann Places 3rd at State





The WHS baseball team completed a positive, though inconsistent, season. As Coach Hullander stated, "Success always depends on your pitching."


Despite some inconsistent playing, there were several highlights of the season. The Chiefs defeated opponent Delano twice, played two consecutive shutouts, and de-

feated Waterville with a comeback win.










Above, center. Senior Matt Ebert catches the ball and sighs with relief. **Above.** Brad Bollmann, with all his strength, whips the ball to the infielders.

Highlights of the season included an 11-1 win over Glencoe and two one-run games against the top teams of Watertown and Dassel-




