## Inga Schmeer, Germany

## Four Block Day Receives Good Reviews

The yearbook staff interviewed Principal Mark Fredericksen about the new four block schedule to see how students and staff were adjusting to the changes.

When asked what the advantages and disadvantages of the four block day were, Mr. Fredericksen said that the school was now able to offer more electives than in any other year, giving students more of a selection of classes. The schedule also encouraged teachers to make the class more active in their studies and discouraged teachers from
lecturing all during the class time. The one disadvantage he found was that students didn't get to see each other as often because of the limited passing time.

Mr. Fredericksen also shared the results of a student survey dealing with the four block day. He found that $66 \%$ of the students were in favor of the block schedule. Some students felt that were getting too much homework. A very common feeling among the students was that the day went a lot faster on the block schedule.
