## The Lost Piece of the Puzzle

On Thursday, November 13, 1997, Matt Weinzierl was seriously injured in a two-car collision on snowy roads. The accident took place on County Road 10 near County Road 43. Matt suffered a massive head injury and was in a coma at Hennepin County Medical Center on life support.

A week later, on November 22, Matt's family made the tough decision to take Matt off life support.

Mass of Christian Burial was held at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Waconia to accommodate the many mourners.

Matt was a wonderful friend who always shared a smile. He worked on the yearbook staff from 1995-1997 and was working on the District 110 web page at the time of the accident. He will be missed by all.

## In Memory of Matt Weinzierl

The following are excerpts from an editiorial written by Matt Heitz in memory of his friend Matt Weinzierl. It appeared in the December 18, 1997, Patriot.
"Two years ago, in a computer class, I met someone who will be sadly missed by all who knew him. . . Mathew Weinzierl. . . I remember the day we met well. It was my first day at Waconia High School. I was more than a little nervous, not knowing anyone in the school. During my computer class, the kid next to me introduced himself as Matt. He was the first person to extend a hand in friendship in this unfamiliar school. From the minute I met Matt, I knew we would become great friends.

years ago paved the way for a close friendship that ended as abruptly as it began. Our days of cruising around in our cars with no particular destination in mind are over. I no longer have a partner for Warcraft 2, the computer game we shared. My best friend will not be here to share in the excitement as I finish rebuilding my car's engine, something we were going to do together. Nor will he be here to attend our high school graduation this spring. That guy who first reached out to the new kid in school; that guy who always had a smile to give; that guy who would always be there when you most needed him; that guy was Mathew Weinzierl, my best friend. He is gone but he is not, and will not ever be forgotten."
