## From Law to Science to Math to Ag, Clubs Offer Students Opportunities

Activities are available at WHS for students who have a wide variety of interests. Four of these activities are FFA, Math League, Science Club, and Mock Trial.

The main activity for the Science Club was preparation for the Science Knowledge Bowl and the Science Olympiad. This group is made up of students with an ambition to enhance their scientific knowledge and have fun while doing it.
At the Minnesota Science Knowledge Bowl, held at Macalaster College in St. Paul, the team competed with other Minnesota schools in a trivia/quiz-bowl type of format consisting of four-member teams. At the Science Olympiad competition at Mankato State University, the team competed in a series of "scientific" events with a 15 -maximum person team. This year the WHS Science Club took ninth place at the Southwest Regions at Mankato State.
The WHS Math League participated in five competitions held at Shakopee High School. Nate Hendren was the leading scorer, taking third place in the entire region of ten area high schools. Every competition consisted of four different levels of twelve-minute contests students take individually and one team contest that lasts for twenty minutes.

Mock trial had a very successful season this year as they competed in the playoffs against Watertown and Eden Prairie.

This year's trial concerned a boating accident involving alcohol in which a boater was charged with murder for hitting and killing a swimmer with his boat.

Students acted as lawyers or witnesses in the case. Practices were held twice a week with Mr. Lee as adviser and attorney Tim Looby as the legal adviser.

## FLA Pilots Violence Prevention Project; Sponsors Food, Book Drives

FLA is a very challenging activity at WHS led by FACS teacher Mrs. Sue Hartwig. Among the many projects the group worked on this year included the competitive Star Events, the pilot project Peace It Together, and FACTS (Families Acting for Community Traffic Safety). Wildcat Odyssey was the theme picked by editor Matt Anderson for the first edition of Pawprints in the new millennium. The book was published by Taylor Publishing Company of Dallas, Texas. Designed on UltraVision software, the 136-page book was printed on 80 lb . enamel paper, smyth sew, with a green Starlight-grained blind embossed cover with Mylar-top brass foil stamping. The endsheets were tan parchment, printed with bamboo beige ink. The page size of the book was $81 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 11^{\prime \prime}$. Body copy was 10 point Athena, and captions were 8 point Athena. The main headline style was Rinna, with special sections using Copperplate Gothic Bold. There were 410 books sold at $\$ 42.00$ each.
