## New Principal at Southview Meet Mrs. DeVaan

In 2001 Khuzana DeVaan became the new principal at Southview Elementary. As a bright new addition to District 110 , she brought many nlew ideas to the school. The yearbook staff interviewed Mrs. DeVaan, and we talked about her past, how she felt about working in Waconia, and her plans for Southview Elementary.
Q: How many years have you been a principal?
A: Five years, four years in Sioux City, Iowa and this is my first year at Waconia.

Q : Where else have you worked besides Waconia?
A. I worked in the Cleveland Public School District and in the Minneapolis School District.

Q: Why do you feel District 110 is a good place to work?
A: The people, the students, staff, and parents make it enjoyable.
Q: What are some of your highlights/achievements from the 20012002 school year?
A: Everyday I get to work with a strong, professional staff. The parents are warm and caring. Everyone is committed in the kids doing well; it makes it an exciting place to work.

Q: What are your goals for Southview Elementary in year ahead?
A: We will continue to have a strong academic emphasis and a positive caring environment.

## Bayview Elementary School Meet Mr. Anderson

This year elementary school students were split up into two different schools. The yearbook staff talked to Mr. Anderson, who is the principal of Bayview Elementary about the split, the changes in the former middle school, and what's ahead for District 110.
$\mathrm{Q}:$ Why was the elementary school split needed?
A: The former elementary school was of the largest in the state. At Southview there were about 800 students. Now at Southview there are about 505, and at Bayview there are about 320 .
Q: What good things did the split bring to the district?
A: There are fewer kids so we can have smaller class sizes. That gives the kids more of a personal learning experience.
Q: What changes were made to the former middle school to accommodate elementary school students?
A: For Minnesota state code, we had to add sprinklers everywhere. We tore out interior lab room walls and added common areas. The band room turned into the music room, we leveled the floor. The bleachers were taken out of the gym, and the floor was redone. The library was redone, some high school kids helped with that. There was a new indoor playground put in.
O : What is in the future for District 110 ?
A: The district will keep growing, a lot more houses will be going up in St. Bonifacius alone. We have a huge wooden castle playground going in. This playground will be designed and built by the community. With the growth in this district, we will be offering more programs for everyone in the future.

Many electives, such as Personal Law, Calculus, and Intro to Windows were also offered.
