







"My favorite memory was the fall camp out because you learn about everyone and become closer as a group," said sophomore Avery Aalfs.







"It is a great way to be involved in world issues and make a difference not only in our community but in the whole world."







"It was sick and not something the jazz band usually does," said junior Michael Zajac.









"All I have to do is step on stage and let it happen. As soon as I feel the lights hit and the curtain open, it's show time" said sophomore Cassia Brand.











Precise team goals and rituals helped to motivate this group.


"This season's goals were to return to state and prove to people who were doubtful that we could have a successful year," said senior Laura Schmitt, the team's only senior.

"Having girls on the team from every grade was a major challenge," said Schmitt. "But we came together and worked our hardest to succeed."
















There was one thing different about this year's team that stood out from previous seasons: more underclassmen played on the varsity team.



Swim team members compete in about two meets per week, which means they have to be as physically fit as they can. This is the reason for the immense amount of practice they put in every day.





With brand new slick black uniforms and big metallic poms, the cheerleaders made quite the impression. They also had new members. Of the 14 members, over half of them were new to the squad.



Winning feels good, but it's not the only thing. According to freshman Avery Talton, being a part of the basketball program is about "being able to go out and play the game I love."







Beyond these attributes, Pierson said they "had a great collection of smart, thoughtful, unselfish people. This was perhaps the biggest key to our success."










Above Right: Senior Austin Millender drives his opponent to his back. Millender's determination forced his opponent down to the mat.






Once these things are decided, it's time to perfect the dance and get it ready for competition.

Other fonts included Pathfinder, Broadway, Bria Bold, Campbell, Brush Script STD, Feltpoint, Algerian, Harrington, Jokerman, Lithospro, Viner Hand ITS, Snowwrite, Coolhand Luke, Kristen ITS, Cristina, Gill Sans, Import, Curlz MT, Ultra bold Condensed, Lunchbox, Wonder, and Gowdy Stout. The cover was designed by the editors, a 4-color cover with matte lamination and an applied uv clear varnish with white index end sheets.

The book was completed with the help of ten students in the Introduction to Yearbook course and the extracurricular students who worked on it after school. Students were advised by Megan Gregor. Maria Benedict, Mary Mahoney, Courtney Borka and Kelsey Kelzer were the editors. The book's theme, "Define," was created by the editors.
