TRANSFORMING WACONIA PUBLIC SCHOOLS



In November 2014, voters passed a \$75 million bond referendum aimed at addressing some much-needed space and facilities issues.

"The transformation that's occurred in the past 3 years is remarkable," Pat Devine, superintendent of Waconia Public Schools, said.

Devine has been keeping the community updated about construction progress along the way, but so much has changed that it's worth a comprehensive look at the new learning opportunities now available for ISD 110 students.

PHASE ONE

Laketown Elementary

With room for 600 students, Laketown added 85,000 square feet of much-needed space for elementary students. The school sits on 58 acres and is surrounded by forests and wetlands. It was important to design the school to fit into those surroundings.

As communities continue to grow, it is important to find space for programs for all of our early learners. Moving the Alternative Learning Center out of the Educational Services Center to a new location opened up a whole new world for ECFE/ECSE and Rainbow Preschool.

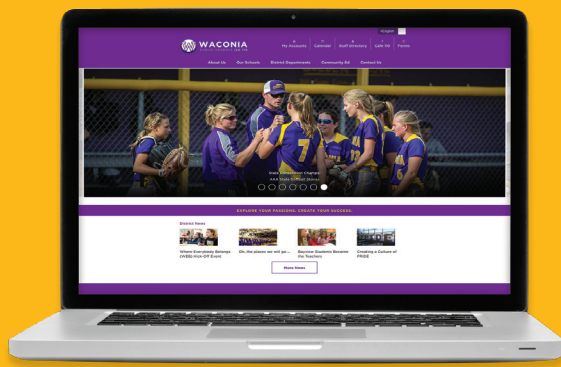
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NEW WEBSITE ISD110.ORG

For those who haven't already seen it, check out the new website that Waconia Public Schools launched in August. The new web address is: isd110.org. The challenge of finding the home page on the Internet has also been fixed with the new website and new address. When doing a Google search for "Waconia Public Schools," isd110.org pops up first on the list.

The website was created based on feedback from parents, staff, and students. It was designed to be organized, easy to navigate, and be an efficient use of time. For instance, all school calendars are now in one area. Users can check which calendar they want to view and then sync those calendars with their devices. There is also a new "single sign-on" feature that reduces the number of usernames and passwords needed.



FINDING OUR BRAND

THE ORIGINAL EQUIPMENT

They call themselves the original equipment—six employees who were around when the then-new Waconia High School opened in 1994.

"I am feeling a little nostalgic. I like this place a lot," Mark Fredericksen, Waconia High School principal, said. "I think about all the kids who went through this place."

Kim Benson, Kathryn Kurtz, Dave Aeling, Mark Fredericksen, Amy Fischer, and Pam Melchert (pictured below from left to right) were all there when the high school opened its doors to students in the fall of 1994. And now, they've said goodbye to that building and moved to their new location just down the road.

"I think we will have a whole new set of stories with the new building," Fredericksen continued. "I look forward to starting fresh, and it's going to be a great place for kids as we go into the future."

The fresh start came on Sept. 11 when Waconia High School opened its doors to students.

Shortly after the summer break began, desks, tables, chairs, and supplies were moved between schools, and construction on the new high school and middle school moved at a fast pace all summer long.

"We are very pleased with how it all came together," Pat Devine, superintendent, said. "All this has been made possible thanks to our strong community support. This construction



project gives us the facilities and space needed to handle growth in the foreseeable future."

As with any large construction project, there were a few items to finish up but the buildings, and staff, were ready to go on Sept. 11.

"As a school board we've listened to the community and addressed our deficiencies, and now, we're here," Brian Rothstein, board chair, said. "It's been a long time coming, and our district is really set up now for continued growth with great facilities and great classroom opportunities."

The new locations for Waconia High School and Waconia Middle School offer new experiences and new opportunities for all students.

TAKING CENTER STAGE

"Performance centers are havens for the arts, and this one is way cool," Doug Lakes, Performing Arts Center coordinator, said. "We now have one of the largest performing arts centers in the state."

The new Performing Arts Center (PAC) at Waconia High School can hold about 1,000 people. The main stage area is rather impressive—40 feet deep, 50 feet across, and 25 feet high. There are more than 180 lighting instruments that can be configured to light the stage in just about any color. There's also video projection capabilities, audio and video recording, data streaming, assistive listening headsets, as well as elevator access and online ticketing.

The advanced capabilities are designed to handle any size of production or performance, large or small, complicated to simple.

"I spent many years in higher education, producing events of all sizes, and it's remarkable what the new Performing Arts Center offers the community and students of all ages," Lakes said. "This space is for everyone to enjoy, and we encourage community groups, businesses, and organizations to consider hosting their events and performances here."

As part of the Waconia High School open house on Oct. 15, the Jason Paulson Band will offer a free concert in the Performing Arts Center starting at 2 p.m.

The official PAC grand opening will be held on Nov. 18 at 7 p.m. Lakes worked through some connections to successfully book illusionist Dan Sperry.



"Dan is one of the most sought-after illusionists of his generation," Lakes added. "He's from Minnesota and agreed to bring his 'Anti-Conjuror' show to Waconia before departing on his 2018 world tour."

Sperry has appeared on numerous national television shows, including *America's Got Talent* and *The Cake Boss*, and also performs regularly in Las Vegas.

"He's considered a 'shock illusionist.' Bringing in such an ambitious act is a great way to showcase our brand-new center and also demonstrate our capabilities," Lakes concluded.

The VIP seating that will be available includes a special preshow meet-and-greet with Sperry.

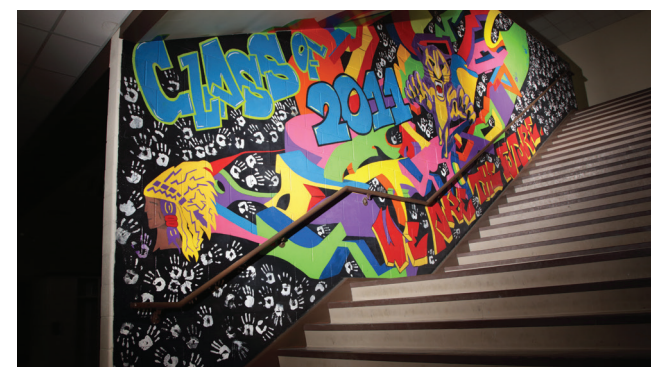
SHARE YOUR TALENTS

BUS SAFETY



Every student needs to know how to be safe on and around the school bus, and it never hurts to remind them of their responsibility in this effort. That's why Waconia Public Schools worked with Koch School Bus Service to produce a bus safety video. The video explains what students need to do while waiting for the bus, approaching it, getting on and off the bus, crossing the street in front of the bus, and so on.

"We will still work with students in person on how to properly evacuate the bus, but this video covers everything else in just a few minutes," Brian Koch, owner, Koch School Bus Service, said. "The great thing is students can go back to review it at any point during the year. So, it's always available to them; they don't have to wait for me to come to their class to do a presentation."

Waconia High School

The referendum made it possible to basically double the size of Clearwater Middle School to create the new Waconia High School. There are 1,350 high school students enrolled this year. The new school has room for 1,600 students and can be easily expanded to accommodate up to 2,000 students.

The addition of tennis courts is a remaining item that had been talked about leading up to the referendum and, following passage of the referendum, stadium seating for the new turf field has also been brought up.

“We will leave it up to the school board to decide what to do with the surplus funds, and I’m sure that tennis courts and stadium seating will be part of that conversation. We expect to have a decision on how we will be proceeding by the end of this year,” Devine concluded. “Overall, this has been a very successful project and will leave a footprint that will impact students for generations to come.”

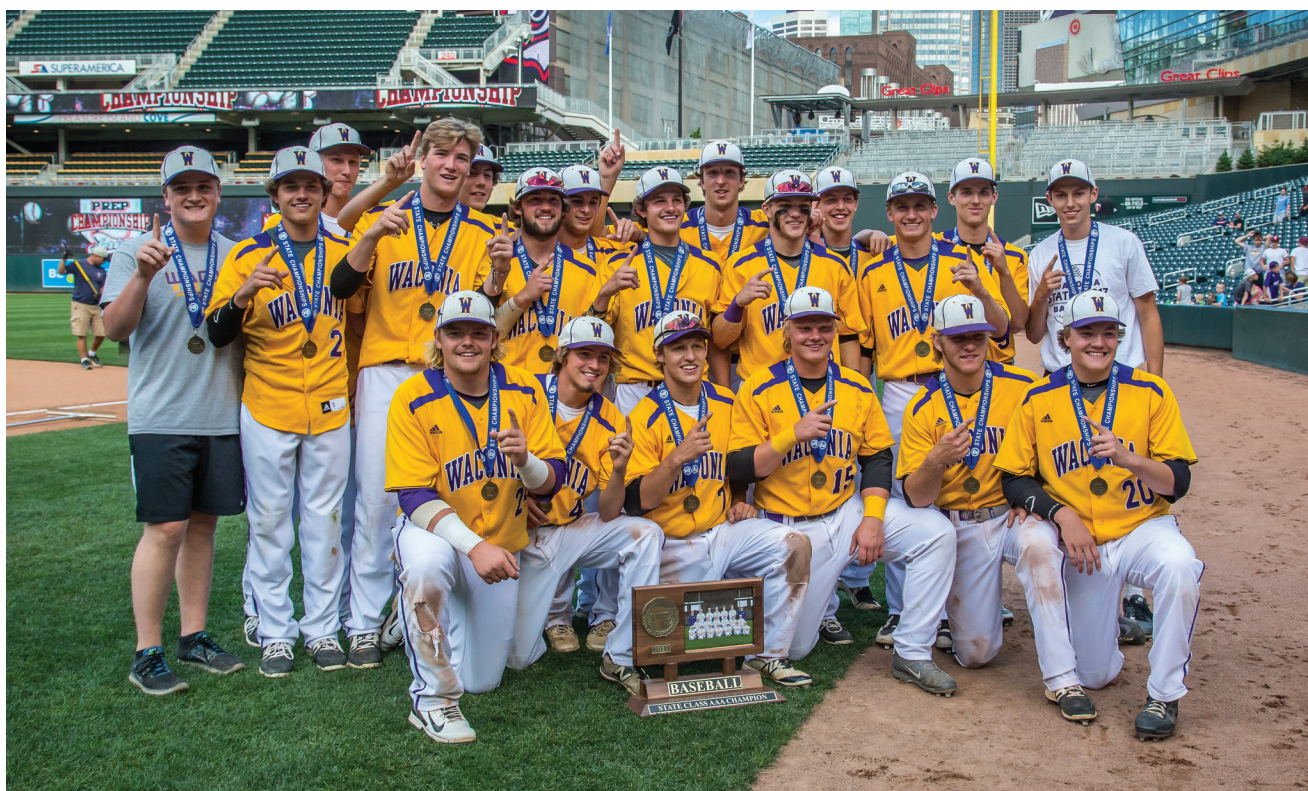
