It's been great to see students taking advantage of our Academic Support sessions being held before and after school. Between the support sessions, targeted services, and athletics there are more and more students in the building.



Community Ed:

Things have been very busy in Community Education lately! It is great to have our early childhood families and children back in the building. It is great to hear children's voices in the hallways.

Right now we are in the middle of our basketball season and indoor soccer practices. We are busy working on the spring/summer brochure and recreation programs. This brochure will be made live online to the public the week of March 15. We are again going to just be offering an online version of our brochure instead of printing a hard copy.

Preschool registration for the 2021-2022 school year has been moved back to March instead of January. We will be offering a virtual preschool open house for families on Tuesday, February 23. Registration for current families will open on March 1 and go through March 12. New families will be able to register starting March 17.

Human Resources:

The School District's Insurance Advisory Committee has reviewed initial medical proposals from multiple health insurance carriers for the plan year beginning on July 1, 2021. Under Minnesota law, initial bids must be maintained as private data until after the final bids have been received and opened. Final proposals will be reviewed at our March 2 meeting, with Committee recommendations expected shortly thereafter. As in past years, open enrollment for the new insurance plan year is currently scheduled to begin in mid to late April.

New Educational and Administrative Support Professionals received training in January on the application of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act to their positions. The training is focused on a school employee's duty to maintain the privacy of student educational data. With little exception, information about students maintained by a school district constitutes private

data and cannot be shared with others without a legitimate educational purpose. Our school district's data privacy training includes an interactive component to allow new employees the opportunity to apply their learning to typical situations commonly found in schools.

Student Services:

We are excited that early childhood through elementary school are providing in-person special education services. Thank you to the staff's efforts pivoting back to in person. Middle school services are provided in a distance format with some targeted in person special education support on Wednesdays. Preparation is underway for a return to hybrid at the middle school. High school has been providing additional in person support to identified students. Education Support Professionals continue to do a great job supporting students in person and in a distance learning format.

In Early Childhood, all classrooms are at the fidelity level in implementing the Pyramid Model. This is a significant accomplishment!

Superintendent:

Safe Learning Plan Continues

This year continues to bring incredible challenges that staff, students, parents, administration and the school board have met with resilience and amazing teamwork to provide the best education possible for our ONE10 students. We are on target to follow through with the expectations that were approved at the January 11th school board meeting. All students in grades E-5 are back to In-Person Learning. WMS has one more week of Distance Learning and will return to Hybrid on February 16th with a staff planning day set for February 12th. WHS has four more weeks of the Trimester and will finish in Distance Learning. On March 16th, after spring break, the high school is set to return to Hybrid.

Currently we are watching Covid numbers in the county, the school district and within our schools. We continue to be on the bubble for grades 6-12 to be in Distance Learning or Hybrid. We are monitoring the learning impact and staffing needs during quarantines. All this data will determine next steps. The Determining Factors used when deciding on which Safe Learning Plan to offer will continue to guide us. At the February 22nd work session, we will discuss when and how we might be able to bring all of our students back to In-Person learning. I will work with the MDE Regional Covid Support Team to see if we can get back sooner than they normally allow, and to find out what safety protocols we will need in place in order for this to happen. It is our hope that, by mid-March, most of our employees will be given the opportunity to get the vaccine to make their return to In-Person learning that much safer.

Planning for the 2021-21 School Year

As we look to the future for ONE10, what have we learned from education in a pandemic? Virtual learning is something that we had not experienced before and now it is something that all students and staff know how to do. We realize that some students and families may wish to continue this learning model into the future. So, we have begun conversations with SWMetro

Intermediate School to see if we can collaborate with them to provide this option to our students/families. We are currently in the design process of making this happen.

We are currently assessing our students and will use this data to determine if we have any learning gaps that have developed throughout this pandemic. The data will help guide our curriculum planning. We will look at summer school and credit recovery options to help keep our students on pace for their age appropriate academic expectations. We will roll back curriculum where needed to keep a sequential learning pace for students.

Covid Relief Funding

We are concerned about the inequity in Covid Relief Funding that we are receiving from the state. Please see the <u>comparison chart</u>. We will express our concerns with officials at the Capital and we will further publicize the inequity if needed. It is important to know that other schools in the state will have more Covid relief money to offer more recovery programs for students.

Covid Vaccination Opportunities and Saliva Tests

The rollout of the Covid Vaccine to educators from the State of MN has been somewhat frustrating. The first four weeks have been completely random on where, when and how many vaccines are available to our employees. The expected return time for registering has been very tight and the registration has not been guaranteed. We have followed the prioritization guidelines and emailed staff as they became eligible. The state has now taken over how to prioritize and communicate to our 1000 staff members when they will have a vaccine opportunity. With all that said, we are thankful that the Covid Vaccination has been offered to about 20% of our staff. We are hopeful that the remaining staff will be given the opportunity for the vaccine over the next six weeks.

On February 3rd we were able to start our bi-weekly Covid Saliva Testing for staff who are working In-Person with students. The saliva test will be offered to staff every two weeks to help identify those who are asymptomatic to reduce the spread of Covid in our schools. We know this could increase our positive cases, but it will also reduce the overall spread.

District Management Group 2021 Superintendents' Strategy Summit

The District Management Group is an educational research group out of Harvard that uses national research to support school operations in becoming even more effective and efficient. I have been a part of this organization through a SWMetro membership for five years. The topics covered in their conferences have helped to streamline programs yet increase student learning. Now, the virtual conference being offered on Feb. 4-5 matches our work with Cultural Competence. I will be able to use this information to help our work to ensure we have a welcoming and inclusive school.
