REMEMBERING CARL PIERSON

On Friday, January 26, we lost a beloved teacher, colleague, friend, and coach when Waconia High School social studies teacher Carl Pierson passed away after

courageously fighting esophageal cancer for two years.

Between his role as a teacher, as a basketball coach, and a city councilman, Carl touched a lot of lives in this community. I realize I'm fairly new to the district, and my relationship with Carl is perhaps not as deep as many of you, but I am glad I had a chance to know and interact with him briefly, as it was very memorable.

It's also been touching to hear and read some of the tributes and memories that people have expressed including on our social media pages. One former student wrote, "I'm so thankful that I had him as a government teacher. He was fantastic at appreciating everyone for who they are and emphasized how important it is to be an active, informed citizen – and those are only two of the many life lessons he taught with his trademark sense of humor."

One of his former basketball players wrote, "He was the best coach and teacher I've ever had. He taught me more lessons than I can count, both on the basketball court and in life in general. He brought so much joy to me and my teammates and to say he will be missed is an understatement. I feel so extremely blessed to have been able to play for him during my high school basketball career. I hope to be even half the coach and person you were."

A Waconia parent shared, "I'm eternally grateful for the impact he had on my daughters, both in the classroom and on the court. The world needs more people like Coach Pierson. He will never be forgotten."

I remember taking notice of Carl during my first fall in the district when Carl was recognized as one of the Accomplished Waconia Educators. In his speech, Carl jokingly reminded everyone, as he held his award, that "It's about time," noting he had been awesome for years. But he also had some words of inspiration for all of us in the room as a part of the public education system, encouraging us to never forget that we get to do the greatest job on earth every single day.

Carl exhibited talent and built relationships throughout our community. I want to express my gratitude and appreciation for everything he contributed to our school district, to our community, and especially to our students. He was a special human being and he will be greatly missed.

for the award. Schluck is in the middle of her third year on the varsity girls hockey team, where she is a captain and one of the team's leading scorers. During her high school career she has also participated in soccer, track and field, and softball. She is an accomplished pianist and teaches lessons at the Waconia Music Studios. She played percussion in the Waconia Middle School Band and also plays the ukulele and harmonica. Schluck is a member of the National Honor Society, the WHS Student Council, and the Conservation Club. In the community, Schluck has volunteered for the Waconia Hockey Association, at the Ridgeview Pediatric Clinic and at New Perspectives Assisted Living/Memory Care. In the classroom, Ella takes a full slate of advanced placement and concurrent enrollment classes and currently has a 4.0 GPA.

"Ella portrays her positivity and leadership qualities by allowing others to feel heard," said Waconia High School teacher and assistant girls hockey coach Colleen Stanley. "She not only leads by example but also allows others to demonstrate their abilities. Ella is well-loved and admired by her peers. In the classroom, this is shown through collaboration with classmates. As a teammate, Ella encourages others to do their best and is selfless with her actions." Koschinska is in the middle of his second year on the varsity boys hockey team, recently finished his second year participating in cross country running, and will play baseball this spring. He is a member of the National Honor Society, has taken a number of advanced placement courses, and maintains a 3.9 GPA. In the community, Koschinska has volunteered at Feed My Starving Children, at the community outdoor hockey rink, youth hockey camps, youth baseball tryouts, and has helped lead elementary faith formation classes at his church.

"I fondly remember Luke quickly establishing himself as a leader in my classroom," Waconia High School teacher Kathryn Kurtz said. "He immediately stood out to me as a great listener and thinker as he would answer questions readily and ask thoughtful questions that demonstrated independent thought and creativity. He is a positive leader in and out of the classroom. He is kind, responsible, friendly, and clearly has the inner drive to bring his best to everything he does."

Established in 1988, the Academics, Arts and Athletics Award (Triple "A") is a unique recognition program sponsored by the MSHSL. The award goes to high school seniors who have at least a 3.0 or better grade point average and who are active in fine arts and athletic activities. The purpose of this program is to recognize and

honor high school seniors who have excelled in the classroom, on the athletic field, and in fine arts, as well as to elevate academic standards and create greater awareness of the value of high school activities.

Dock plays the trombone in the WHS Band, is a member of the Wildcat cross country and tennis teams, and takes a number of advanced placement courses while maintaining a 3.99 grade point States Air Force Academy to study mechanical engineering next year.

"Carben was enrolled in my AP World History course and during that time I got to know him as a student and an individual. It became clear to me early that Carben was an exceptional student with strong academic abilities, but great character as well," said WHS Teacher Joey Kretchman-Grande. "No matter who was in his class, what the subject of the lesson was, or how we were going about learning it, Carben's peers looked to him for guidance, collaboration, and support."

Herold has participated in the school's pep band, jazz band, marching band, and show band since ninth grade. Athletically, she participates on the Wildcat cross country and track and field teams. In the classroom she takes a number of advanced placement and concurrent enrollment classes while maintaining a 3.9 grade point average. Herold plans to study international business next year.

"There are few students that I have worked with in my career that serve as better role models than Amelia," WHS teacher and band director Nick Hansberry said. "She is conscientious in her through her various leadership positions in the concert, marching, and jazz bands. She works to create lasting positive change in whatever activity or organization she is involved in. I cannot think of a student that is more humble, kind, and deserving of this award."

Waconia High School's new competitive speech team competed in its first tournament on Jan. 20 at Orono High School. The team had one team member break through preliminaries into the varsity merit division finals, and an additional eight students break into the novice division finals.

Senior Landon Shaw advanced to the merit round finals in the Discussion event, where he took first place. Shaw backed up that result with another first place finish in the merit round finals at the Wayzata Trojan War Tournament on Jan. 27. In the novice division finals at the Orono Tournament, third place finishes were recorded by junior Shane Zimmerman in Creative Expression, senior Hannah McCarthy in Extemporaneous Speaking, and Junior Gianna Klaphake in Prose Reading.

Fifth place finishes in the novice division finals included junior Leo Thayer in Extemporaneous Speaking, freshman Isabella Benson in Creative Expression, and senior Simon Peitersen in Discussion.

Senior Stella Atkinson placed sixth in Original Oratory and senior Mariah Port placed seventh in Discussion.

Other key novice results from the Wayzata Tournament included senior Mark Van Nurden's first place finish in Dramatic Interpretation, Atkinson's third place showing in Original Oratory, and Zimmerman's fourth place finish in Creative Expression.

BOYS SWIMMING & DIVING

The boys swimming & diving team qualified for the State True Team Meet for the first time in program history, where they earned a 10th place finish. Junior Jack Hackler won the 100-yard breaststroke event at the meet. The team also captured its first ever Metro West Conference title on Feb. 1 by and sophomores Audrey Brown and Addison Bryfczynski.

WRESTLING

The wrestling team has battled through a number of injuries this season to remain in top 10 state rankings, where they are currently No. 7 in class 3A. 

WACONIA HIGH SCHOOL'S PRINCIPLES OF ENGINEERING STUDENTS PARTNER WITH SACKETT WACONIA FOR REAL-WORLD DESIGN CHALLENGE

Many classes at Waconia High School provide hands-on, experiential learning opportunities. One of those classes is Principles of Engineering.

The class partnered with local business Sackett Waconia to create a Design Challenge for students. Students were asked to plan, design, and engineer a prototype manufacturing system that would

efficiently move one of Sackett Waconia's Rotary Blenders through the different processes in the facility. Representatives from Sackett Waconia were at the High School today to interact with students, see their designs, and talk about future job opportunities in manufacturing and the trades.

Principles of Engineering is a course in Waconia High School's Project Lead the Way (PLTW) sequence. It is a project-based course that introduces students to the professions of engineering and engineering technology, by exploring various technologies related to manufacturing processes, and engineering systems.




EIGHTH GRADER CREATES MURAL AT WMS
